Hastings Skating Club 2023 – 2024 report

This time frame has been a difficult period for the Club. Our number of competitive skaters has fallen. Skaters have left skating to further their educational studies or taken the option to skate in local Club based competitions rather than at a national level.

This year the Club has 3 skaters skating at NZ Champs and for 2 of these skaters it will be their first NZ Champs competition. The Club also had one of their Minis National skaters compete in the Junior Pacific Championships held recently in New Plymouth and this was a wonderful experience for the skater. The Clubs National level skaters have competed in all competitions offered in the Central Area and have represented the Club with pride. Skaters have also been involved in training camps offered by Mercedes Carrascosa and they found the camps to be extremely worthwhile.

The Club's Learn to skate class is growing again in numbers. The affects of Cyclone Gabrielle are still being felt and this is affecting many families financially, to the extent where choices are being made as to who in a family can skate. The class consists of mainly 7 – 10year olds and this is a change we have noticed as adults are not involved in the Clubs Learn to Skate classes.

The Club has an advanced Learn to Skate group and these skaters are keen to further their skating. They have become federated members and are now preparing for their first competitions this year. There is a huge amount of excitement in this group and they love having fun and enjoy learning new skills and working together as a team for Precision type activities.

In previous years the Club has had an abundance of Coaches and senior skaters prepared to be involved in helping at Learn to Skate. This year has seen a decline in coaches actively involved at Club level. This unfortunately has mainly been due to health issues and concerns affecting some of our Coaches, and with ongoing health effects. These health issues are also affecting their ability to be involved at an officiating level.

Club skaters have experienced success at Area and local competitions and have been successful passing their required medal tests.

The Club will continue to offer Learn to Skate classes based on the Kiwiskate model and hopefully this will provide growth in our beginning skaters who are keen to further their skating to local competitions.

Club Report for the 2024 Artistic Committee AGM

The New Plymouth Figure Skating Branch is continuing to grow from strength to strength.

Our membership has grown by a total of 3 members, with overall membership of 43, consisting of:

- 1x life member
- 27x competitive members (of these, 3 are also SSL coaches)
- 12x supporters/volunteers
- 1x official (and SSL coach)
- 2x memberships on hold

We continue to see our League and Novice skaters progressing forward from last season, with 2 now qualifying for the NZ Artistic Championships this season. Once again, we will have 16 skaters in attendance this year, which is a zero net difference to last year.

We are also seeing a significant increase to the number our NZ Artistic Championship skaters progressing forward to Oceania/Pacific Cup. This year we had 11 skaters competing at the event, compared to 3 last year.

Kiwi Skate continues to provide our branch and community with a strong artistic skating foundation. Due to high demand, this year we increased our maximum class numbers from 30 to 40 per term. Due to the increase in intake numbers, we expanded our Kiwi Skate Coaching team, with an additional 3 in process of gaining their accreditations, and an additional 2 assistant coaches.

Our branch co-hosted a successful Medal Test weekend in December 2023. We have already begun to consider what this year's test season will look like for our skaters and will begin planning and preparation once the impending Star Skate testing process is released.

We continue to spread the word about skating in the local community by hosting Show Skates, fundraising roller discos and other fundraising events (including school holiday skating). As we all know this sport is self-funded, so we do what we can as a branch to help support our skaters, parents and their support crew to make skating as accessible as possible for all involved. Public Sessions are still the bread and butter for our main club, each branch taking turns running two sessions every Friday (12 and under, 12 and over) which see 200+ skaters every week in attendance.

Our branch Executive Committee is a group of supportive, involved and motivated volunteers, who work very hard for the better of our branch. We are thankful for their dedication and commitment to our sport and our skaters couldn't be here without their work behind the scenes. Thanks team!

We are looking forward to the remainder of 2024 and excited to see what 2025 will bring.

Since last year we have continued to progress skaters through our Learn to Skate system with around 20 skaters on the verge of moving to our Junior Club section. We are maintaining a membership of over 500, with a record 413 skaters who participated in our classes during 2023. So far for 2024, 270 people have attended 1 or more sessions with us, and approximately 100-120 skate each week. This is pivotal for us as we didn't receive the full amount requested from our funding applications this year, and classes are the income stream that subsidises the cost of the stadium for our club skaters.

We still feel privileged to be skating out of the Trusts Arena, however it does come with a hefty price tag, and as funding is becoming harder to receive, it is becoming unsustainable, but we don't have any other viable options to move to currently. We are also thankful that due to our good relationship with the Stadium staff that when a parent of a skater who was associated with us, but used casual court time, got in trouble for permanently marking the floor without permission it didn't have any kickback on our club.

While we aim to subsidise the floor hire cost for our skaters, we do still need to cover our costs & some families have had to make hard choices this year & withdraw from some trainings, some competitions, or from the sport altogether as their disposable income isn't there anymore. We hope that when relief does come for them, they will remember the positive experiences they had with us and return, but are aware that whatever they have used to fill the gaps, they are more likely to stick with. However we have seen the return of some skaters that have been with us previously, so that's a really positive sign for the environment we are trying to create.

A huge thanks to our Learn to Skate coaches & administrators; Larissa Mutton, Janelle Paton, Steven Neville, Lea Cazzaniga, Natalia Noone-Jones, Nina Pikul, Lindsay Simpson, Jacqueline Huang & Leanne Burling who volunteer their time every week to ensure the skaters who attend these classes have enjoyable experiences and they keep coming back. We have a group of younger skaters who are observing & helping under the guidance of Emily Clague.

Our development precision teams began their competitive journey this year & attended Areas & Regionals. They joined the 4 other precision teams that our club fielded this year. We will be running another muster after nationals to begin an intake for the next squad group so that we can encourage the next batch of keen skaters to upskill further. We are thankful to the coaches that take these teams, as we value the environment that group skating encourages, and consider this an important part of the pathway for skaters to progress into the competitive world.

Our international representation this year saw Lisa Garrud, Andrew Rae & Emma Bailey selected for the NZ Oceania Team this year & our Awaken Quartet also attended the Pacific Cup Championships.

Unfortunately, as many families are feeling the financial impact of the cost-of-living increases, and as it's not in our hometown, we field a smaller team to Nationals this year, but we know these skaters & teams will do their best and we look forward to celebrating their successes with them.

We continue to push forward with the growth of our club and believe we are creating a positive environment for our skaters to continue their individual journeys for success and enjoyment in our sport.

Club Report to Artistic Committee 2024

2023 and 2024 has seen a mix of highs and lows for The Hamilton Roller Skating Club.

The low being the fire which caused considerable damage ...some of which is still in the process of being fixed

One of the 'Highs' was the response to a 'Give a Little' page set up by one of our Club members to help with the cost of the damage not covered by insurance. We were stunned, not only by the generous monetary support for which we are very grateful, but also all of the wonderful comments from the members of the public, the Mayor, the Deputy Mayor, other Clubs and members of the skating fraternity from around the country. We even had people turning up at public sessions putting money on the counter saying, "This is to help with the fire". It was humbling to hear, "You guys are amazing, and we just want to help," from the public at large who enjoy the facility.

The money has gone into a dedicated account, and should we end up with a surplus after expenses, it will be transferred to a 'vandalism' account, just in case anything untoward should happen in the future.

A positive from the fire is increased Council awareness of the vandalism on the park surrounding our rink with increased lighting being erected in the area. It certainly feels safer leaving at night.

Another high has been the recent completion of extensions to our Clubrooms which has been project managed by Kathy Moody, a Trustee and Club Treasurer. We now have space to keep valuable equipment in a secure, almost fortress style addition. We have a dedicated kitchen area, a large area for storage plus work- bench space and equipment for maintaining our hire skates

Costs have been kept to a minimum and funded 100% by the Public Sessions we run.

These Public Sessions, run entirely by volunteers, not only provide recreational skating for the people of Hamilton and outlying areas, but they also support and subsidize our competitive speed and artistic skaters.

- They allow us to keep our Club fees to a minimum- \$23.00 per child and Adults \$35.00.
- They allow Club skaters to pay nothing for dedicated 'Practice Time'.
- They allow the Club to pay our competitive skater's Area and National entry fees. Our skaters pay nothing for these competitions.
- All competitive skaters get an equal share of funds raised at our Fundraising Theme Nights run by both Speed and Artistic.

- Our International Skaters (Speed and Artistic) also get an equal share of the Sponsorship secured by the Club from ‘Summerset Retirement Villages.’
- Additional grants are made from Club funds to each Skater making an International Team. \$300 for NZ based competition and \$500 for offshore.

Despite there being some misunderstanding in the skating Community about HRSC fundraising Policies, our skaters both competitive and non- competitive are well looked after as we strive to keep the sport affordable.

Our Club is indeed fortunate to have had our life member Kathy Moody raise over \$1.2 million over twenty years to build our facility in stages, without incurring debt. Our thanks also go out to the volunteers, who rain, hail, and shine, run public sessions and learn - to - skate sessions with no financial benefit for themselves. Thanks in particular to Lyn Ashton who manages to recycle and keep our hire skates functioning despite many of them being decades old.

On that note, our Club is delighted to see the Federation recognising the benefit of recreational skating. Our public sessions continue to grow. They are well loved by the community as we keep costs low (\$3.00 entry and \$2.00 to hire for public sessions)

We run a Learn- to -Skate Session every week where Club Members and 2 of our Coaches giving their time freely to help the public with their skating skills. These are also kept to an affordable \$3.00 entry including skate hire. They attract up to 100 skaters a week. Our Saturday and Sunday sessions attract on an average between 300 to 500 skaters. We also have fortnightly sessions dedicated to Home- School families.

Whilst our Registered Competitive Artistic numbers are not growing, we have skaters learning Artistic Skating for their own enjoyment (particularly adult skaters who want to learn, have fun, and increase their skills but have no interest in competition). We are also finding that our Monthly Themed Fundraising Discos which are well supported by this group, are increasingly becoming ‘social events’ as well as fundraisers for our competitors.

Our numbers in Speed have grown significantly. Their pathway into competition is less complicated. We have had a number of children join, compete at National level and even place in under 12 months.

We wonder if the medal test pathway is a hinderance for children (especially in the 12 to 13 yr age group) into Artistic competition.

So, highs and lows in general. It’s fun and satisfying to see the number of new adults enjoying our sport and the increasing numbers of whole families from the low socio-economic area in which we sit, turn up week after to week and tell us what it means to have supervised affordable sport and recreation available.

We are looking hard at what opportunities we can explore in the latter part of the year to keep our growing group of recreational skaters engaged, and pulling in regular skaters who at this stage are not necessarily Club members, to create and explore more fun times for all.

Mt Wellington Roller Sports Club Artistic Report 2024

General

Advanced class - the pathway into competitive skating, has swelled to 17 skaters. All are club members. Around half look to be working towards Areas competitions.

Consistent numbers at Saturday LTS. Numbers tend to drop around public holiday weekends.

Monday learn to skate class has 22 enrolled for term 2, and our new Beginner Adults class has 8 skaters who are training for Beginner Competitions, including the upcoming Regional Champs. All skaters in the learn to skate Monday classes are club members.

Competitions

Northern Areas were held at the Sportsdrome in Rotorua, 10 - 12 May, and Mt Wellington skaters earned 23 medals! (16 firsts, 4 seconds, 3 thirds)

Auckland Regional Champs are on 22 June.
NZ National Championships are in July.

Oceania Championship 13-17 June - Rebecca and Hannah have been selected for the NZ Team
Pacific Cup 13-17 June - Joey and Mahalia are competing at this championship

Rachael Parkinson-Turner has been appointed the World Team Coach.

Beginner competition

We held our first beginner and novice competition on Saturday 25 May. We had 54 skaters of all ages registered from the 4 Auckland clubs (Auckland Waitakere, North Shore, Franklin).

Feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, and we intend to run again in around September with the view to hold the competition annually thereafter.

Financially the goal was to break even after costs and factoring in the loss of income by not holding learn to skate.

This event has been noted by the SkateNZ Board as an excellent example of a club encouraging significant engagement at grassroots level. This meets SportNZ's strategy goals of increased community participation in sports.
